Arizona DMV and Registration Requirements

New residents must register vehicles and obtain Arizona driver's licenses within a specific timeframe:

- Register vehicles within 15 days of establishing residency
- Obtain Arizona driver's license within 30 days
- Vehicles in Pima County (where Tucson is located) require emissions testing

Visit an Arizona MVD office or authorized third-party provider with your current license, proof of identity, and proof of Arizona address to complete these requirements.

Tucson Weather Patterns
